We aim to provide many opportunities for parents and the school staff to come together to learn more about children, their progress and how we can better work together in partnership.

Parent volunteers This is a plea to parents that every teacher is looking for and wants parent volunteers their classrooms, especially to assist with reading in the mornings. This is not just a request from the teachers in the junior years but a request right through to Year 6 teachers. It is very important that child reads everv everv day, understands what they have read and reads with fluency and expression. Practice, practice, practice is how reading improvements and we need a Army of parent volunteers to listen to children read every day.

Staffing Changes Last week Ms Greig, Deputy Principal (Years 1,2,3), informed me regrettably that she will not be continuing at Challis for personal reasons. This was effective immediately and we have spent some time reallocating Ms Greig's responsibilities between the formal leadership team.

As such, Mrs Egan will be responsible for Kindy-Year 2 and Mrs Musumeci will manage Year 3 issues. If you were communicating with Ms Greig about a situation with your child, it would be helpful if you made contact either with Mrs Egan (K-2) or Mrs Musumeci (Year 3) to make sure they are aware of the situation and can continue to work with you to resolve it.

The chart will assist you to see the connections between each staff member within a year level team and identifies the Team Leader and Deputy in charge of that phase. For the time being, the third Deputy Principal position will remain vacant.

Mr Maguire is taking leave for all of Term 3 and his replacement is close to being confirmed. We have two new Pre Kindy classes starting at the commencement of Term 3. Ms Monique Capill is the new teacher.

Ms Velliou is returning to Challis and will take up a tandem PP class along with Mrs Jacob in J8. Ms Velliou will also be teaching on Mondays in W3 (starting Term 3).
